



Packers Stadium



Lambeau Field is the Packers' stadium located in Green Bay, Wisconsin, USA. It opened in 1957 and is the oldest stadium still in use by an NFL team. With a seating capacity of over 81,000, it's known for its cold weather and is often called the "[Frozen Tundra](#)". The stadium is named after Curly Lambeau, the Packers' founder. It also houses the [Packers Hall of Fame](#) Museum.

Frozen Tundra

Lambeau Field has long had the nickname of "[Frozen Tundra](#)".

The nickname comes from the famous 1967 Ice Bowl between the Packers and Cowboys that was played in temperatures that were 15 below zero and a wind chill around -50.

Since then, the Packers have had plenty of other games that were played in sub-zero temperatures in northern Wisconsin.

The Packers created a 50-foot replica of the Vince Lombardi trophy which was unveiled in 2014.

It is made out of a combination of metal and foam, weighing 14.5 tons. At night, the trophy lights up and can be seen from the streets outside of the stadium.



The [Hall of Fame](#) is two stories and roughly 15,000 square feet, it consists of over 160 members.

These are the vip seats. These seats have windows, which can be opened to really feel the game spirit.

Next to the Lambeau Field there are small houses which the fans can rent so they don't have a long way home after the game and many beers
